New laws will bring big crackdown

WAR ON RADIO PIRATES

THE big guns of legislation are lining up to sink the Republic's pirate radio stations.

And companies who spend thousands of pounds a week advertising with the pirates will face a broadside of tougher penalties.

The "declaration of war" was made in the Dail yesterday by Posts and Telegraphs Minister Padraig Faulkner.

Now it looks like the end of the road for the pirates—more than eighteen of them.

Mr Faulkner told Deputies it was his intention to introduce a Bill before Christmas.

This would provide for much heavier penalties and make it an offence to collaborate with the operators of the pirate stations.

Pressure

Mr Faulkner said that under existing legislation only RTE could be given a licence to broadcast.

Whether there should be any change in that position was one of a number of aspects of broadcasting to which he was giving attention.

Opposition Urban Affairs spokesman Michael Keating urged the setting up of some authority for the issuing of licences for Independent Radio.

Independent Deputy Noel Browne said that RTE—who plan a second National Radio Service next year—were not catering for the people's needs and private enterprise would exploit them.

A spokesman for one of the pirates—Alternative Radio Dublin—said last night: "The Minister has to contend with public opinion and the people of Dublin have had local radio for the past nine months."

They were hopeful that public opinion would bring sufficient pressure on the Government.

"We want licensed Commercial Radio," the spokesman said.

Threat

A consortium of business interests—including three Irish newspapers—has been put together to set up a Commercial Radio station.

But it has delayed applying for a licence until a decision was made by the government.

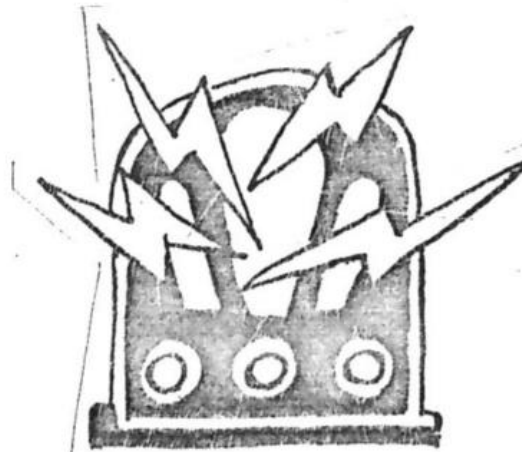
Any move for Commercial Independent Radio is bitterly opposed by RTE chiefs and by trade union leaders.

MANX RADIO (one of the oldest commercial radio stations in the British Isles) broadcasting from an island in the Irish Sea called the Isle of Man has proved that it is possible to find advertisers willing to buy time during serious Radio 4 type discussion and talk programmes. Although Manx Radio had had rough times of it financially for some years, it is now starting to make a profit. Recently the station has moved from its old 232 metre slot on M.W. to the much clearer 219 metres (1368 kHz) and at the same time the power output has been upped to 4 kW. VHF is to go into stereo in 1979, followed swiftly by a move to 24 hour broadcasting. Quite suprising considering they have just three engineers and a chief engineer who between them cover both the studio and transmitter operations. the change to 1368 kHz meant a large amount of additional installation work at the transmitter (located in a part of the Isle called Foxdale) new aerial equipment was installed to carry the power from the transmitters to the two aerial masts. The other M.W. service of 1594 kHz is now discontinued. the increase in power output is quite noticable with reception reports coming in from Northern Ireland, The East coast of Ireland, all over Northern England and parts of Scotland.

EUROPEAN MUSIC RADIO was first heard on the air during the early part of Spring 1976.

These transmissions were on a weekly basis, run by a group of enthusiasts who felt that they could provide a service of music and information to all short wave listeners. After a series of test transmissions on the 48 metre band, E.M.R. opened with a full schedule service on the 22nd May 1977. On the 17th of September 1978, E.M.R. changed to the 41 metre band. This change had to be made due to the bad noise and interference which was present on our old 48m slot. Over our two years of operation, we have received many reception reports from a variety of countries which includes Denmark, East and West Germany, Belgium, Holland, Sweden, Norway, Finland, France, Switzerland, Italy, Ireland, United Kingdom and many more. The studio equipment of European Music Radio consists of: 1 Multi channell mixer with pre-fade-listen. 2 Garrard decks, 1 multi track tape deck, 1 studio microphone, 1 studio monitor amplifier and a programme compressor unit. E.M.R. transmits every third Sunday of the month, from Europe to Europe on 41 metre band. On Sunday, September 10th 1978 at 11.01 GMT, RADIO VIKING was being closed down by the Danish Authorities. That finished 13 months of successful broadcasting in the 48 metre band. R.V. started on August 7th 1977 with irregular transmissions, but since December 1977 R.V. has been on the air every Sunday with a fixed schedule. Pirate radio silenced

Post office officials, accompanied by local gardai, last night raided the studio of Waterford Local Radio at Killotteran three miles outside the city and seized the transmitter, claiming that it was engaged in pirate radio in the area.

The radio had been broadcasting records and local gossip since last May and several complaints had been made to the post office authorities in connection with the operation. Broadcasts went off the air following the seizure.
